The three wise men were always my favorite characters in the Christmas story. As a child, I am sure this was born out of my strong affinity for royalty and because, in my young mind, the wise men were the justification for gifts at Christmas. As an adult, I do still have an affinity for anything to do with the royal family, but I guess I have not given the wise men much thought until recently. I see now that the actions of the wise men were profound and came at great personal expense – far beyond the monetary value of the gifts they brought.

Scripture gives us a horrifying glimpse into the political climate following the birth of Jesus. Herod was so paranoid about losing power and authority that he resorted to mass-infanticide and the holy family became refugees overnight. Things must have been bad if the safest place for asylum was Egypt: historically not the most welcoming place for Jews. And yet, what seems like a barbaric bit of ancient history is still uncomfortably relevant.

How have I become numb to the refugee crisis happening all over the world? It's easy to rush to the aid of someone in an acute crisis, one that has a clear cause and is limited in time and scope. However, I get weary in the face of widespread, systemic crisis. I use the complexity of the geopolitical situation to justify my apathy and the concerns of my family's safety to mask my fear of people that do not look like me.

As much as this part of the Christmas story is divine, it is also political. There is an inherent risk that comes with being a follower of Christ. The wise men knew it, and they probably died for it. At the very least, they lost their power, fortune, and prestige in Herod's court. I must ask myself, who would I let take refuge in my home, if I thought it could save their life? Our hope of freedom and our salvation from sin came at a tremendous loss of life; a cost I have never given thought to until now. I pray that I might be as brave and as strong as the wise men.
